



GFD Lieutenant Receives Distinguished Service Award

While working on October 7, 2014, Lieutenant Brian Peyton went to visit a customer at a local Galena residence. Upon entering the basement of the home, Lt. Peyton noticed a strong smell of natural gas. He immediately shut down the gas supply, and then went to retrieve a gas monitor from the Galena fire station. Upon re-entry into the basement and taking a reading, it was evident that there were extremely high gas levels in the home. It was at this time the owner of the residence arrived home. Lt. Peyton opened all of the windows to ventilate the residence. Peyton explained the situation to the home owner, who then called a contractor to inspect the furnace. It was determined that an exterior underground gas line was defectively causing the gas to leak into the basement of the home. While it is unknown what the consequences may have been, it is quite possible that a potentially tragic outcome was averted by Lt. Peyton's quick, logical, and professional response to this situation.

Based on the aforementioned actions of Lt. Peyton as documented per GFD Policy #13, Section 5, he has been awarded the Department's Distinguished Service Award. The Distinguished Service Award is awarded *"to a Galena Fire Department member for outstanding performance of duty under unusual or difficult conditions. The actions need not involve exposure to physical danger, but must be involved in the protection of life and property, and involve unusual thoughtfulness, conscientiousness, and initiative"*. For his actions, Lt. Peyton was given the Distinguished Service Award Certificate and an accompanying uniform ribbon. While already presented before his peers, Lt. Peyton's actions will be recognized at the next GFD Annual Recognition Dinner.

Fire Prevention Week, October 5–11.

The Galena Fire Department has visited the schools during Fire Prevention Week for as long as can be remembered, usually on Friday of Fire Prevention Week. This year it had to be postponed until the next week because the schools were not in session on the Friday of Fire Prevention Week. Kindergarten thru 4th grade students at the primary school, were visited in the morning, while the 5th thru 8th grade students in the middle school, were visited in the afternoon. All of the classes at the Tri State Christian School were also visited during the day.

Videos are shown followed by a question and answer session. There are also demonstrations of exiting a home in the event of a fire, and an introduction to a firefighter in full turnout gear.

The 5th and 6th grade students participate in a poster contest depicting the theme of the current fire prevention week. The winning students are awarded a trophy for their efforts. During the visit to each of the schools we will pull an alarm and monitor how the students and the teachers will react and make sure that all of the fire plans are properly followed. At the same time we will also set off an alarm at the high school.

This quarter, GFD responded to a structure fire alarm on Nov. 7th. The alarm came in as smoke in the residence, but soon was escalated to a fully involved garage fire. Members from East Dubuque, Menominee- Dunleith, Hazel Green, and Scales Mound departments, along with the Galena Ambulance assisted in the alarm. Luckily the newer house was built of brick and the adjoining wall from the garage to the house was cement block. The fire was contained in the garage with light smoke and minimal water damage inside of the residence, with no injuries to report.

On Dec 12th we responded to a residence with a chimney fire. Smoke was coming from the eaves upon arrival and the crew knew right away that this was going to be more than just a chimney fire. The stove pipe from the wood stove had caught an interior wall on fire. If not for the quick action from the initial fire crew there would have been much more loss to report. There was minimal interior damage with no injuries to report. East Dubuque, Menominee - Dunleith, Hazel Green, Scales Mound, and the Galena Territory departments, along with the Galena Ambulance assisted in the alarm.

We responded to a Hazardous Materials incident alarm on Dec. 27th. A home owner inadvertently mixed two chemicals together when they were trying to clean out their toilet. The home owner called the Fire Chief who himself called Firefighter Steve Neuhaus. After some testing of the air quality in the house, they determined that they were dealing with a very toxic chemical. The fire department was called and Firefighters then ventilated the house. There were no injuries to the homeowners or to any of the firefighters.

During the unusually warm weather we had during the month of December we were called to a field fire on Dec 31st. With the help from the Menominee - Dunleith, and Hazel Green Fire departments, the fire was quickly placed under control.

And of course we had our usual number of red box alarms, many occurring at a local motel and a nursing home.




Galena Fire Department Training Center

At long last, a well designed, highly anticipated Galena Fire Department Training Center has finally been achieved. Groundbreaking took place June of 2014 for the earth moving and hydrant placement. The tower/burn building construction began September of 2014. By October 2014, the training center tower/burn building had been completed. Planned for spring 2015 are curb and gutters, along with completion of the roads.

The tower/burn center will include the following capabilities:

1. Two burn rooms, one ground floor and one on the second level.
2. Confined Space Prop specifically designed for confined space rescue.
3. Wall Breach Prop
4. Overhaul/Ceiling Prop
5. Sprinkler Heads
6. Stand Pipe
7. Two different roof pitches with each having removable sections for the ability to do ventilation drills.
8. Three story tower with anchors to do rope rescue training.

The tower/burn building is not the only training activity that is going to take place at the training center. Part of the cul-de-sac will contain an extrication pad. In addition to present construction, a retention basin exists that will be utilized for rural drafting, and ice rescue training. A training building with classrooms, truck bays, and restrooms have been planned for to be developed during the next phase of the project.



Paradigm Shift and the Galena Fire Department

Part 1 of 4

One definition of a Paradigm Shift is to change from one way of thinking to another. It is a transformation and is generally sustainable. It just does not happen, but rather it is driven by agents of change, people who believe that situations can improve and that organizations can change direction to support their best interest.

The Galena Fire Department (GFD) has been around since 1830. It is a department deep in tradition and pride, a respected part of the community. GFD is known and recognized as a good department with good people who volunteer their time and effort in keeping safe the citizens and to visitors of the City. The GFD is the epitome of the term 'professional volunteers'. With a strong sense of tradition sometimes comes complacency and acceptance to a particular way of doing business. While this approach has worked for many years, the changing world, with all of its complexities, may render the "way it has always been done" attitude outdated and potentially unstable to the point that routine issues become complex and complex issues become risky, to both the organization and its members. GFD is no different than any other organization. Transformation becomes necessary when existing conditions do not adequately address present and future challenges.

Approximately three years ago, some random discussions took place advocating some potential changes in some aspects of the Galena Fire Department. Participating in these discussions were GFD members, including officers, with one basic common goal - to take the GFD to a new level concentrating on acceptable fire service organizational practices emphasizing professionalism, integrity, liability concerns, sound leadership, and personnel training and safety. In addition, developing a better relationship with the community and with those with whom we need to collaborate was a primary consideration. While there was consensus regarding where the department should be in five or ten years, there was admittedly, some question on how to get there. One of the fundamental characteristics of this challenge was an acceptance that what was about to happen had no end point, that is, it was a journey and not a destination. This four part article communicates our journey.

Once consensus was established, the first step taken was to establish a group of members who would tackle one of the more timely GFD challenges - a diminishing number on the active member roll call which was approaching the high twenties. Based on a "decades old", maximum of 63 members, and looking at our limited response during certain times of the day, the Recruitment and Retention (R/R) Committee was formed. Headed by Assistant Chief Bob Conley, this group of approximately twelve GFD members addressed several initiatives in an attempt to increase our membership. Committee members included GFD active members and were representative of the department in terms of rank. This was consistent with the tenet that was established for ensuring that all members have a role in this process. After a period of approximately one year, this committee's efforts were validated with rising membership into the mid-forties, a substantial increase. This is an ongoing process.

At the direction of newly appointed Chief Beadle, and as a follow-up to the GFD recruitment initiative, several of the pre-entry level test processes were reviewed, as well as the adequacy and consistency of the entire application process. This led to recommended changes to the hiring process that first required a complete review of existing department procedures, By-Laws and guidelines addressing this issue. Standard Operating Guidelines (SOG's) were non-existent but not for a lack of trying. Captain Terry Werner had spent many hours creating a near complete set GFD SOG's that were unfortunately not considered a priority, and for this reason not addressed or moved forward. Existing By-Laws provided long-standing and effective direction for meetings and GFD business issues. They also included issues that were best moved to other documents. In addition, it was important that several recorded and non-dated modifications were addressed and properly placed to avoid confusion. With all the best intent, there was limited current, clear, and consistent policy upon which members could rely. This created a challenge for GFD Officers as they went about their respective responsibilities. As a result, the focus was on developing a revised and updated By-Law document, creating a new Policy and Procedure Manual, and updating the existing Standard Operating Guidelines to deal with specific operational procedures.

Within the next eighteen months, GFD members completed a Standard Operating Guideline document, revised existing By-Laws, and developed a Policy and Procedure Manual, which now respectively serve as primary GFD guiding documents for fire service operations, business meetings and activities, and general rules addressing every aspect of department. GFD members were made aware of all changes throughout the several-month process. All three documents were reviewed and approved by all GFD members. For the first time, all three documents were acknowledged by each member and made readily available for all members in both hard copy and electronically. These documents were shared with Galena City Administrator. In addition, it was determined that all GFD guiding documents would be reviewed every two years and updated as necessary.

Getting back to the recruitment issue that instigated the development of the above documents, several significant changes were made to the GFD hiring process over the next year. These projects were completed simultaneously and included, but are not limited to, the following.

- Development of a new Member Application
- Development of a Recruit Interview Process
- Development of a new entry-level Physical Ability Test
- Elimination of Member Voting for New Members

(Note: These changes may be addressed in more detail throughout the four-part series of this article.)

While the R/R committee was successfully addressing the recruitment issue, they came to the conclusion that any recruitment effort was essentially worthless in the absence of an accompanying retention initiative. Additionally, this addressed another tenant of the R/R Committee - All changes will be dealt with an eye on sustainability. No one was interested in going through this process without some assurance that these changes were designed to last. Given the declining level of volunteerism in our world today, compared with that of thirty years ago, it is imperative that new members be provided with reasons to stay engaged and become long-term GFD members, notwithstanding the fact that being a volunteer firefighter is not a vocation that everyone can manage or sustain.

Bottom line - it was a waste of time and effort for the GFD to recruit good members if no effort is given to retaining these members. This challenge was accepted by the R/R Committee. Working under the premise that essentially everything we do can have an impact on firefighter retention, several initiatives were developed and adapted to assist in this process. To that end, the following programs have been developed over the past few years that were driven by the principles stated above - emphasizing professionalism, integrity, liability, sound leadership, and personnel training and safety.

- Three Week Recruit Orientation Program
- Recruit Mentorship Program
- Acknowledgement of a GFD Code of Ethics
- Familiarization of GFD Policies, SOG's and By-Laws
- Development of a new Post Recruitment Year Written Test
- Elimination of Member Voting for Completion of Probation
- Member Commendation Program

(Note: These changes may be addressed in more detail throughout the four-part series of this article.)

Galena, Illinois Fire Department History

Volume 1 Article 2

December 27, 2014

This quarter's article will focus on Old Fire House # 1, located south of the present day firehouse on South Bench Street. A few things will be discussed before we get into the history of that building in order to clarify some points.

In researching the history of the Galena Fire Department, much information is being taken from the Resource Room at the Galena Public Library. In case you have never been in this room, do yourselves a favor and go down there sometime. It is a treasure trove of history. There are copies of the Galena Gazette and all of its predecessors all the way back to 1836. The Galena Fire Department started on February 1, 1830. There is minimal information between the origin of the department in 1830, and the newspapers in 1836. There are older copies of the papers that refer to some earlier articles, but not many.

Old Fire House # 1 was built in 1851, and the Liberty Engine Company # 1 took over occupancy of the building on December 11, 1851, according to the Galena Daily Advertiser newspaper, dated December 12, 1851. The article states that the building had an engine room on the first floor, and an "apartment over the engine room that was fitted in a very neat and modest manner". It appears to have been paid for by "subscriptions". In many articles in the early history of the department, the word "subscriptions" is used quite often. The subscriptions lead to the conclusion that fire companies were supported by individuals residing in the covered areas by each of the fire companies.

The December 12, 1851 Galena Daily Advertiser states "this company deserves a new engine of more modern and lighter construction, better fitted to this peculiar locality." The initial fire department established in 1830. An article in the July 2, 1836 Galena Weekly discusses the arrival of a Fire Engine for the Town of Galena. Two engines appear to have been purchased in 1836 and built by the Selye & Porter's New York Fire Apparatus Company in Rochester, New York. The Selye & Porter Company was in operation from 1832 to 1867. One of the engines was for Fire Company # 1, still known at that time as the "Cataract Fire Company", and the second engine was for the "Neptune Fire Company # 2". They arrived in Galena on August 25, 1836.

Galena Daily Gazette, dated December 9, 1874 mentions the year 1837 stating that Cataract #1 had a meeting at their firehouse. The meeting location at the corner of Main and Green Streets, where Koehler's butcher shop now stands. Prior to the Old Fire House # 1 on Bench Street, it appears that there was an additional firehouse possibly located on Main Street, in proximity to the DeSoto House Hotel. Additional research will be completed in the upcoming months, to see if the original location of Cataract Engine house can specifically be identified.

We know that the Old Fire House# 1 was opened in December of 1851. We can only assume that when it did open, it was still using the 1837 Selye engine. The article that states that the firehouse has its Grand Opening, also states that this company deserves a new engine. That request did not go unheard. In early January of 1855 there were two new Agnew Fire Engines built in Philadelphia, PA.. They both arrived in Galena and put into service by the Liberty Fire Company (formerly theCataract Fire Company). The Agnew Company was in business from 1826 to 1861, and their equipment was considered to build one of the finest firefighting apparatuses of the day. They built approximately 500 engines. The first call that the Agnew was put into action took place on January 18, 1855. Both engines were reported to have been kept in use for a total of 50 years.

The Cataract Fire Company and the Neptune Fire Company were big rivals. The Companies had some difficulties in the late 1830's and early 1840's. The Neptune looks to have given its subscriptions and records to the Cataract Company in February of 1839 as Neptune was not able to operate independently. In 1843, the Mechanics Company, most likely the Hook and Ladder Company was established. On July 26, 1843, there was a joint meeting of the Neptune, Cataract, and the Mechanics Companies, and all disbanded. There appears to have been a short period, possibly a few years that no organized fire companies existed in Galena.

On October 28, 1851, Liberty Fire Company # 1 was organized, and the constitution of the old Neptune Fire Company was adopted. This appears to be where the name Cataract was dropped in favor of the Liberty Fire Company # 1. Further investigation is taking place to see the reason that the word "Cataract" was used as the first name of Fire Company # 1. It was shortly thereafter that Neptune reorganized, and then the purchase of the Agnews took place. It is understood that this was when Neptune was located at the Market House on the left side of the building in 1846.

The Old Fire House # 1 appears to have been in operation until 1936, when all five of the companies reorganized into the present day Galena Fire Department. The engines were operated by hand until the late 19th century when horses were used to pull the equipment. The last known horse drawn engines were in 1916 or 1917 when the department became mechanized. It is reported that the mechanized vehicles included 2 Model T Fords, one hard-rubber tired Republic, and two four-cylinder Chevrolets. It is not known which stations housed these vehicles.

In March of 1936, at a Galena City Council meeting was held the Galena Volunteer Fire Department was formed, and nominations for Executive officers and line officers commenced. The Council voted on these nominations at the April 1936 meeting. The roster was decided to be 60 members, and new members would no longer be accepted until some of the sixty active members dropped out of the department. The old companies and the Fire Association passed out of existence at that time. The funds of the Association were turned over to the new company that met twice a month, on the second and fourth Mondays.

On April 8, 1936, the Liberty Hook and Ladder Company held a farewell dinner at the Old Fire House # 1 at 7:00 p.m. It was a gala affair according to the newspaper article, and dignitaries of the city gave many speeches. Those included the mayor, aldermen, and the police chief. Three of the members were unable to attend, so members of the Fire Company took suppers to each of them. The article stated that the Liberty Hook and Ladder Company is the oldest fire company in the city, and one of the oldest in the state. It was with regret that they were disbanding. It appears that the newly purchased fire trucks were a great motivator to get the small companies into one new company.

Two weeks after the farewell dinner, it was announced that the city had accepted a bid from the Howe Fire Apparatus Company of Anderson, IN to purchase a new ladder truck. It was a Diamond T chassis with a Hercules motor, and a 400 gallon pumper and ladder equipment.

The uses of Old Fire House # 1 have been various after it was no longer used as a Fire House in 1936. It is indicated that in April of 1936, the Boy Scouts were allowed use of the building without any expense to the city. It is not known how long the Boy Scouts used the building.

In an article dated, June 18, 1936, mention of the Old Liberty Pumper states that the pumper was removed from the Fair Grounds, now Recreation Park, and it is being repaired and painted. The article makes no mention as to whether or not it is the Agnew or another vehicle. The article states that the pumper is believed to be over 100 years old, and several years older than the pumper shown at the Chicago fair.

In two Galena Gazette articles from November and December of 1948, it was found that the Old Fire House # 1 was leased to Ralph Benson and Earl (Rusty) Sproule to open a Horseradish Factory. The company was known as the Torch Products Company and made all horseradish products such as pure horseradish and horseradish sauce. The December article stated that 500 dozen bottles were shipped to Clinton and Rock Island to distributors who will ship the orders to various parts of the country. The products being used to make their product is coming in from St. Louis. The owners expect the business to expand to the point that they will need larger quarters in the future.

A non-dated article states that the fire bell from Firehouse # 3 was removed from that structure and installed into a temporary framework inside Fire House # 1, which was being renovated as a historical attraction. The bell, manufactured in West Troy NY in 1880 was made of genuine bell metal. The weight of the bell is approximately 500 pounds. In 1957, Old Fire House # 1 was restored by Bob Simmons and Dick Karberg, both Galena Fire Fighters, at a cost of \$ 1,919. It was restored again in 1979 at a cost of \$ 8,250.

Old Fire House # 1 now houses the recently renovated 1855 Agnew. The #1 firehouse is believed to be the oldest firehouse in the state of Illinois. With the restored Agnew in the structure, it may be one of the only structures of its type in the country. Few old buildings remain as a stand-alone building, but it is assumed that even fewer exist with one of their original pieces of restored firefighting equipment.

This station stands as a reminder of where the Galena Fire Department began, and shows the strength and commitment that still exists in this department. It stands as a monument that should forever be maintained by future generations. The entire community of Galena has every reason to be proud of this historical #1 station, as well as the present station. The Galena Fire Department is fortunate to have responsible volunteers. Men and women who will arise from a sound sleep, leave a holiday dinner, brave the cold, and suffer through the heat of their equipment in the summer to answer the call. And if they miss a call, they pay a fine!

As my first Chief, Obbie Hirst once told me, the reason people call the fire department is because they can no longer help themselves. Those words will stand the test of time.
